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Honoring the Mission - Apollo 13

The emails were hot and heavy for weeks between KOSMO members and Dave Kovar of FLARE in New Mexico. He was heading to Kansas to be part of the Honoring the Mission, the 40th anniversary of Apollo 13 at the Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center. With him would be his outstanding model of a Saturn V and its launch complex as well as a Mercury Redstone and Gemini Titan. The main go between was KOSMO member John Palmer who lives in Hutchinson. He made many contacts with the Cosmosphere and gradually the schedule and site were set. Dave rolled into Kansas Wed. April 14th. He was met by his brother Steve who had driven in from Kentucky. Steve had gotten Dave into rockets way back when.

Thursday morning Steve and Dave along with KOSMO members Duane Lanterman, Keith Ravenstein, John Palmer and the Zongker family were given a first class tour of Space Works in west Hutchinson by Cosmosphere collections manager Meredith Miller. In these unassuming building sit an amazing collection of space memorabilia, some in great shape, some just setting on shelves as is. There were the workshops where dedicated workers build and shape space craft for the local museum, museums through out the world and for movie makers like Tom Hank's Apollo 13. For a model rocketeer this is pure heaven. Where else can you touch a radioactive nuclear missile. (ok, so I didn't know till after Meredith said that) Back to the Cosmoshpere, we got to tour the area when Space Camp takes place. Very cool indeed.

Thursday evening Dave, Steve, and John set up an amazing display of model rockets highlighting both KOSMO and FLARE in the Cosmosphere below the SR71 hanging from the ceiling. Visitors on Friday, especially a large number of school groups enjoyed the display. Friday evening several KOSMO members joined Dave, Steve, and John for a sold out viewing of the movie *The Wonder of it All* in the IMAX theatre.

Saturday morning dawned with clear if cool skies. On my trip up to Hutch the thermometer showed about 36 degrees as we rolled through Lyons, Ks. about 6:30 am. We arrived at the Cosmosphere parking lot a little before 8am and shortly afterwards my wife Sharon and I were joined by Mark Johnson, Ron Shipley, Steve Saner and wife, Linton Bayless and son, Peter. We headed to the football field and found Dave and Steve beginning to set up the pads and launch controller. The clock clicked by very quickly and soon a crowd began to form on the east side of the field. I marveled as person after person had their picture taken with the Saturn V and launch complex. Usually one finds the modeler poising with his rocket, but here grandkids and grandparents alike wanted to be pictured with the rocket of interest. Right at 9am the PA welcomed the crowd of about 350 people, thanks were given to the appropriate people who had made this event possible, and then the words of John Kennedy echoed through out the stadium, "I believe that before this decade is ---". We were back in the 60's and America had dreams. The within 15 minutes the crowd witnessed the flawless launching of the Mercury Redstone, Gemini Titan, and finally the Saturn V. The actual final minute of the countdown at the Cape was played over PA, the white room retracted, the smoke from pyrotechnics rolled from the pad, and at T-0 the E15 lifted the Saturn V, the button pressed by Nathan Windler the grandson of Milt Windler (mission director of the purple team) who was also in attendance. The rockets landed within the football field, the Mercury capsule and Apollo capsule landed on or near the abandoned flower shop across the street. (soon to be museum parking). With the aid of a pole vault bar I retrieved the "Mercury crew" from the roof and thanks to the "locksmith work" of Peri Saner, we entered the fence around the flower shop and retrieved the "Apollo 13 crew".

We then headed to the Sports Arena to hear the Mission Control specialist tell their story. On stage were Guenter Wendt, Joe Kerwin, Gene Krantz, Gerry Griffin, Sy Liebergot, Milton Windler, Jack Lousma, Ed Fendell, Jerry Bostick, and moderator and space historian, Andrew Chalkin. The talk ran about an hour with interesting insight, some humor (one of the specialist before answering the question, said "before I begin, tell me do I look as old as all these other guys?", and in answering a question from the audience, a decidedly negative response to the recent Obama offerings for the manned space program.

The round table talk was followed by an autograph session that was a delight. Apollo 13 astronaut Fred Haise joined the group and as the faithful went down the line found each of the men friendly, very personable, and eager to visit and sign their memorabilia. Kosmonaut John Palmer who had been taking inventory at his store that morning joined us at the autograph session as well as the Zongker family.

For most of us the day ended at this point (although not the enthusiasm). Some members took in the *Apollo 13* movie at the IMAX. Steve and Dave Kovar took in the evenings activities including the gala dinner and VIP event. John Palmer continued to collect pictures and autographs as the honored guest were staying at the motel next to his store. It truly was a day to remember. It was truly an *honor* to be part of Honoring the Mission.



Guenter Wendt Passes Away on May 3

A little over 2 weeks after the gala celebration Honoring the Apollo 13 astronauts and mission control specialist, Guenter Wendt passed away from heart failure and a stroke. Wendt who was 85 emigrated to the US after WW II, worked his way up the ranks of McDonnell Douglas, becoming a key element in the Mercury, Gemini, Apollo, and Shuttle programs. Wendt was a great friend of the Cosmosphere which he considered the best space museum in the country. Those Kosmonauts who briefly met him on April 17th feel the loss of this man who was so inspiring to generations.
