## **KRAMO 38 REPORT**

Going back to its very foundation in 1980 of the Kansas Organization for SpaceModeling is our organized contest called KRAMO (Kansas Rocket AeroModelers Open). Over the past 38 years the contest has been an OPEN or REGIONAL Meet (and once a sport launch) and this year a NRC event. Early on it gained the name "The Friendly Rocket Meet" and has stayed close to that vibe over the years. This years edition was no different and attracted 13 contestants (15 fliers in all) from Kansas, Nebraska, and Missouri.

The event is traditionally a two day event but it was evident early on that Sat. was going to be way to windy so the word went out that it would be a Sunday only event and we would be starting early to allow the events and fun flying to proceed. Sunday dawned a beautiful day and the famous (or infamous) Kansas winds were no where to be seen (well, not seen, but you know what I mean!) Everyone pitched in and soon the Kansas State Fair Grounds parking lot became rocket central! Results of the 6 events are summarized below -

OPEN SPOT LANDING – This event is almost always flown at KRAMO and this year Ron Snow dialed in first place with a distance of 4.87 meters followed by Brad Smith and James Johnson. All thirteen contestants gave this event a try.

1/2A BOOST GLIDE – A nice field of 8 contestants gave this a go with a variety of models and the results were very close among the first four with Keith Ravenstein taking first, Steve Saner placing second, and James Johnson rounding out the top three.

1/2A PARACHUTE -Three places to three contestants, first going to Duane Lanterman, second to Steve Saner, and third to John Palmer.

A STREAMER DURATION – Duane Lanterman took first in this event, followed by Steve Saner, and John Palmer.

A HELICOPTER – Only two contestants tried this event with interesting results. Tim Reidy had a good first time of 38 seconds but Duane Lanterman's first flight was 51 seconds and looked like a sure bet for first. Tim followed with a second flight of 31 seconds. Duane's second flight failed to deploy its rotors assuring Tim Reidy the first place ribbon and Duane second.

C EGGLOFT – An egg event is standard fair at KRAMO and this year proved as interesting as always. 8 very different models took to the sky with Tim Reidy's beautifully deployed 36" chute recording a 115 second flight and a safe landing for the fragile payload. Duane Lanterman gathered in second with 59 seconds and John Palmer capturing third.

The overall win went to Duane Lanterman followed by Steve Saner and John Palmer. We all cooled off during the awards at Ken's Pizza as has been tradition for a number of years now. First place in each event received a \$5 Subway gift card and Duane took home the Ron Shipley Memorial trophy for another year.

Besides the 55 contest flights Sunday, there were 54 sport flights thrown in for good measure. The rockets flown were as varied as you can imagine and lots of fun to watch. Tim Reidy of Nebraska City, Ne. who was flying with us for the first time had the most sport flights at an even dozen. Brad Smith had 8 sport flights with his wife contributing another 3 along with some contest flights. This was her first rocket outing and along with their two dogs had a good time. Steve Hamous brought his two grandson's out for some fun flights and John Palmer's grandkids came out to watch poppie launch some rockets. It was just a fun Sunday in Hutchinson with friends and family.
