

### KRAMO CELEBRATES 45 EDITION – AND PERSONAL MEMORIES

Shortly after NAR Section #427 was formed the idea of holding a contest later in the year emerged. The name KRAMO was chosen, standing for Kansas Rocket AeroModelers Open. Up until last year the contest was a two day event and for many years during the heyday of NAR competition it was designated a Regional meet with competitors from 4 or more states. With today's current competition format those larger meets are mostly a thing of the past. The last number of years it has been mostly just current club members and a few guest at KRAMO and the events chosen have allowed for some creativity. This years events were a perfect example of that thinking. We had "A" Estes Alpha Parachute Duration which featured stock Estes kits with the competitors choice of parachutes and also "B" Estes Alpha Steamer Duration once again with stock Estes Alpha's and the competitors choice of steamer. This was definitely the most popular of events with 6 competitors in each. KRAMO has always featured a spot landing contest and the past two years we tweaked the rules to allow two attempts at the spot. All 7 competitors tried their hand at this Open Spot and the second attempt allows competitors the chance to tweak their attempt and adding to the fun. Boosting eggs into the atmosphere has also been part and partial of KRAMO, from "B" Eggloft to "D" Eggloft to Dual Eggloft to Egg Altitude events. This years event was the same as last year with "C" Estes Green Egg duration. We used completely stock kits. Last year saw some great performances, but this year the wind pick up during this event greatly effecting the results. The last event this year with "1/2A" Boost Glide and the field was rather small but required one competitor to make a second flight in order to secure first place.

For myself KRAMO holds a special place in my heart. I started with KRAMO 2 and have made each event since other than KRAMO 20. This event introduced me to a host of wonderful people and this hobby. I have known Mark, Bonnie and James Johnson, Steve Hamous, and Peggy Warnock and Mike Mitchell since 1981. I have experienced the passing of a number of great friends, Joe Warnock, Ron Shipley, Dennis Elder, Ron Snow and others who have graced our flying fields. I remember the building/repair sessions at the motels, fun evening at All Star Sports, Saturday night buffet suppers, thunderstorm and tornado sirens, tree climbing and lake rescues of errant rockets, the competitor packets put together with manufacturers catalogs (before the net), the "Welcome to KRAMO – The Friendly Rocket Meet" pencils and buttons provided by Joe and Peggy Warnock, spending a weekend of vacation with my two kids and wife and the necessary Motel 6 pool they required, and so many more memories. I kind of yearn for those days and yet am thankful that the club continues this yearly tradition and KRAMO has been able to tally its 45th Edition.

Results -

A Parachute Duration - Carol Bailey was the class of the field with an 81 second total followed by Austin Streit with 60 seconds and Steve Saner with 55 seconds.

B Streamer Duration – This event was a close one! Steve Saner edged out Carol Bailey by 2 seconds, 69 seconds to 67 and Carol's husband Douglas was only 5 seconds behind at 62.

1/2A Boost Glide – only two competitors with Steve Saner's total being 34 seconds and Duane Lanterman a distant 17 seconds.

C-11 Green Egg Duration – Austin Streit grabbed first place here with a 44 second total with Steve Saner a close 39 seconds. Duane was a distant third.

Open Spot Landing – Austin Streit had a great attempt at a difficult spot with only 6.1 meters from the pin. Steve Saner was no slouch at 7.62 meters and Jeremy Lepel a commendable third at 17.5 meters.

As you might assume Steve Saner was the overall winner of the event, Austin Streit placed second, followed by Duane Lanterman in third. Carol Bailey gathered fourth place, Douglas Bailey fifth. Sixth place went to Jeremy Lepel and first time competitor Paul Morgenroth placed seventh.

A BIG THANK YOU to Jeremy Lepel for running the contest and purchasing the prizes and Zac Twigg for hauling out the launch equipment and PA and to Danny Stahl who came out to visit and ended up launching a very nice Little Joe.

Rocket Day has its roots at Caney's Lincoln Memorial Elementary school in the late 1970's. Third grade teacher Joe Wanrock (founding member of KOSMO along with his wife Peggy) built rockets with his kids along with teaching principles of rocketry. This event went on for many many years. Several years ago 4<sup>th</sup> grade teacher Adam Wright brought back the event at the school. Adam was a former student of the late Joe Warnock and had fond memories of Rocket Day. This years event featured Estes Alpha's flying on A8-3 engines. 56 flights in all were made that day with only one anomaly, a separated chute. ## SATURDAY JULY 12- HUTCHINSON KS- STATE FAIR GROUNDS PARKING LOT – 9AM TO 1 PM

### SATURDAY AUGUST 16 – HUTCHINSON KS – STATE FAIR GROUNDS PARKING LOT-9AM TO 1 PM

The parking lot at the State Fair grounds in Hutchinson is our low/mid power field. We do limit flights to Class 1 rockets (which generally means up to a G impulse motor max) that can reasonably be expected to stay within the bounds of the field.

Our July and August launches are mostly a morning launch to avoid the heat of the day that is typical in Kansas. There is no alternate date for these launches.

### SATURDAY SEPT. 13 – ELLINWOOD KS- LANTERMAN FAMILY FARM – 10AM TO 5PM

The Final Frontier Fun Fly launch is one of three launches in the Ellinwood area this year. This is our largest and most open launch area, which means that high power rockets are allowed at this event. We will file an FAA waiver good to 10,000 ft above ground-level. Generally speaking, this will allow up to a K impulse motor. Note that you must be properly certified, or be getting your certification, to fly high power rockets. If you would like to get Level 1 or Level 2 NAR certification, we have members that can help you with that. Please contact us if you have any questions.

While high power rockets are allowed at this launch, most flights tend to be of low and mid power rockets. So do not hesitate to join us even if you are not flying high power.

If there is unfavorable weather on September 13th, we are scheduling an alternate date of September 27. Watch the web site or Facebook for scheduling changes.
